Meet Our Longest Resident Member, Cedric N.

"I was born on 22nd June 1952, in Oxford, the same month and the same year that Queen Elizabeth II became Queen. We moved to Birmingham when I was 18 months old because my dad had got a job in the library of Birmingham University. He previously worked for Oxford University Press. I had a good childhood and went to Harborne Infants' School and then Harborne Junior School where I took and passed my 11 plus. I then went to King Edward IV Five Ways Grammar School. I really

I then went to Liverpool University reading Electronic Engineering and gained a B.Eng degree. I then started work first with Plessey Telecommunications where I was responsible for the installation and commissioning of telephone exchanges for

the then GPO. Although Plessey's headquarters was in Liverpool, my work took me all over the West Midlands, so I was able to live at home. It was during this period

that I met and married Pamela and we had three children, Eleanor Frances, Michelle

Amy and Christopher Andrew. It was also during this period that I was given the

opportunity to study for an M.Sc at which I was successful.

I joined CEGB Midlands Region as part of the Telecommunications section and took a role in the Telephony aspects of the work because of my previous experience. After a while an opportunity arose to join MEB in the Telecommunications section where I joined the group installing private telephone exchanges. I was soon leading this group. I continued in this role and assumed a position in a customer service environment where all my customers were internal. It was during this time that we moved to Great Haywood in Staffordshire because the schools had sixth forms. This move was entirely justified as our children went on to get a variety of GCSE's, Alevels and degrees.

It was also during this period that I discovered I had Multiple Sclerosis, I was

diagnosed in 1987 after a visit to my GP following a spate of tripping over quite small

objects such as doorsteps, stairs and the like. My first question was not to do with me, I asked if I had given it to my children. I was relieved to be told "No". It is caused by a virus and cannot be passed on genetically. I continued working as if nothing had happened, but walking became more difficult. I first walked with a limp, then with one stick, then two and then I couldn't walk at all. Throughout this time my family, work colleagues, work superiors and friends were all extremely supportive. I had an adapted car from MEB and the Company even went so far as to arrange special car parking for me at all the sites. That was at every office and every depot. I eventually took the offer of retirement on ill health grounds. The Company was now privatised and had changed owners twice, but they were still good to me and the retirement package was too good to miss. I had a full final salary pension, a generous lump sum and a car and I was only 50.

We had a family conference and together decided that my moving to a care home

would benefit everybody, me because my quality of life would be better and the

with their own lives knowing that I would be well looked after. A new care home had

everything worked out, we were all determined that this was the place for me. Everything worked out and so on July 1st 2011 I moved out of Great Haywood into room 12 Horsefair Care Home in Rugeley. My quality of life has certainly improved, and I have had visits from all the family.

It was during June of 2017 that following a care review, it was determined that I would benefit from nursing care. This was not available at Horsefair. A few months prior to this, Pam decided she had had enough of living so far away from our family and started looking at houses for sale closer to Eleanor. She found a lovely place in Hinckley which is about 15 minutes away from Eleanor. The whole family then set about getting the house in Great Haywood ready for sale. When it went on the market, it was sold in two days! Pam moved in February 2017 with the family controlling things.

During this time we were looking at places for me and eventually, I moved to The

Ashton, a care home in Hinckley that provided nursing care. This move placed me






